Dear Governor-Elect Sherrill,

As our nation faces an unprecedented housing crisis, we stand at a defining moment in New Jersey's history.

Our state has a shortage of over 200,000 homes affordable to extremely low-income households, while rents and home prices continue to rise beyond reach. Teachers, nurses, construction workers, service workers — the very people who sustain our communities — are being forced out.

By requiring every municipality to create its fair share of affordable homes, the Mount Laurel Doctrine has had transformative benefits for New Jersey. More than 400,000 New Jerseyans now live in homes created through this framework, which has emerged as a national model.

In the wake of the national housing crisis, a bipartisan consensus has emerged in support of zoning reform. States from across the political spectrum — from Texas to Massachusetts to Montana — have recently passed laws that incorporate elements of New Jersey's groundbreaking policy framework.

Increasingly, policymakers and the public are recognizing that inclusive development is not a burden — it's an opportunity to strengthen communities, attract employers, and grow local economies. Towns that embrace affordable housing are seeing new life in long-neglected sites and new energy in their local economies. They're proving that inclusion builds stronger, more resilient communities — and that when we open our doors, everyone benefits.

New Jersey's landmark new law, A4/S50, has streamlined the affordable housing process, increased transparency, and reduced bureaucracy. The law gives towns a wide variety of tools to create affordable housing in the way they prefer. Municipalities can choose from a range of options that take into consideration the unique qualities of every town.

Thanks to this law, over 420 municipalities — many more than any time in the Mount Laurel Doctrine's 50-year history — are now moving forward with creating affordable housing. This process validates the intent of A4/S50 — making the process more efficient and encouraging more municipalities to participate.

We are encouraged that during your campaign, you pledged to address housing affordability — including ending outdated zoning laws that block new homes from

being built, stopping diversions from the Affordable Housing Trust Fund, expanding support for first-time and first-generation homebuyers, and cracking down on landlords who leave families facing unlivable conditions and discrimination. These priorities reflect the kind of comprehensive, equitable approach that New Jersey needs to ensure everyone has a safe and affordable place to call home.

As you take office, it is an especially critical time to implement these priorities — both to maximize the benefits of A4/S50 and to prevent a surge in evictions driven by federal budget cuts.

We, the undersigned, look forward to working with you and your administration to enact the following measures that we support:

- Champion and fully enforce A4/S50, ensuring that we move forward with transformational affordable housing developments already in the pipeline.
- Protect and expand the Affordable Housing Trust Fund, which is often the only public source of funding for smaller, community-driven, shovel-ready developments — and expand housing funding by reserving at least 50% of the mansion tax for urgent housing needs, including preserving existing affordable housing and stopping evictions.
- Expand tenant protections such as preventing collusion among landlords, banning unconscionable rent increases, and limiting discriminatory screening practices — to safeguard renters from displacement, predatory practices, and housing instability.
- Implement zoning reforms to allow a wider mix of housing types and to make it easier to redevelop abandoned offices, malls, and other under-utilized infrastructure.
- Create greater opportunity for emerging developers, faith-based developers, and Black and Brown developers, ensuring that those who have historically been excluded from development can now help build the future of New Jersey's communities.
- Ensure workers who build and maintain affordable housing are treated with dignity, paid family-sustaining wages, and have safe working conditions.

 Take steps to prevent state and local law enforcement from criminalizing people simply for being homeless.

Affordable housing benefits everyone. It fuels our state's economy, increases labor mobility, strengthens our schools, and keeps families together. We look forward to working with you and your administration to make our communities stronger, more equitable, and more resilient for generations to come.
